Clinical Corner



OHP Prioritized List Top 10

With a tip of the hat to David Letterman, we have looked at the newly announced OHP Prioritized List for January 1, 2018 (located <u>here</u>) and have devised a TOP 10 List for Umpqua Health Alliance providers highlighting changes or unappreciated nuances already in the Oregon Medicaid system.

10. Smoking cessation applies to almost ALL surgeries

Ancillary Guideline Note (GN) #A4 requires smokers to be abstinent for four weeks prior to elective procedures. Documentation required: urine test negative for cotinine (complete abstinence) or anabasine/anatabine (if using nicotine replacement therapy or vaping). Some surgeries require six months abstinence (GN#8).

9. Back and Spine Pain: NO & YES

NO to opioid Rx coverage. This doesn't mean you should still prescribe them and have the patient pay out of pocket! NO to MRI imaging when findings are not going to change the management. YES to medical therapies including chiropracture, acupuncture, and physical therapy up to 30 visits/year in conjunction with CBT and therapeutic exercise. All require a Prior Authorization form a PCP. See GN #56.

8. DX must fit a funded line; CPT must pair

Be sure your PA request has a DX that maps to a funded line (#1-470) AND the CPT code pairs with the DX on this line. Click <u>here</u> for look-up tools, or call us to schedule a one on one training for your staff if needed.

7. Glucose Test Strip coverage follows CMS rules

This means 100/90 days (QD testing) for Type 2 diabetes, unless prescribing multiple short acting insulin. For Type 1 and gestational diabetes,100/30 days (TID testing). PA is required for higher frequency of testing and needs documentation of rationale/utilization to match the Rx.

6. Expanded coverage for CGM in T1DM

Continuous glucose monitors (CGM) are transforming the treatment of well-motivated Type I diabetics, along with insulin pump therapy, with the artificial pancreas device on the horizon. The OHP has expanded coverage of CGM; see GN #108.

5. Addition of a number of appropriate codes and Dx/CPT pairs

These new additions emphasize appropriate surgical procedures that are now covered, hopefully reducing some frustrations in the care of our members.

4. New Line #500: CONDITIONS FOR WHICH INTERVENTIONS RESULT IN MARGINAL CLINICAL BENEFIT OR LOW COST EFFECTIVENESS

This includes drugs, procedures, tests and therapies that are listed in GN #172.

3. New Line #660: CONDITIONS FOR WHICH CERTAIN INTERVENTIONS ARE UNPROVEN, HAVE NO CLINICALLY IMPORTANT BENEFIT OR HAVE HARMS THAT OUTWEIGH BENEFITS

This includes drugs, procedures, tests and therapies that are listed in GN #173.

2. Though we moved the PA process over to CIM, you can avoid extra work by submitting your PAs electronically and just reference the office notes, imaging, etc. in the Centricity EMR that support the request and avoid scanning or faxing.

We will look at the notes you define for support of your PA request.

<u>1. Treatment for Hepatitis C has been expanded to patients with Fibrosis 2 or</u> greater; use simple blood test (FibroSure®) to determine fibrosis staging, no need for biopsy or trip to Portland for FibroScan®.
